Dr. Manoranjitham Sathiyaseelan Retires



Dr. Manoranjitham Sathiyaseelan, Professor and Head of the Department of Psychiatric Nursing, retired on June 20, 2025, after 34 years of exemplary service at Christian Medical College Vellore. Her association with the institution began in 1982 as a B.Sc. Nursing student. After fulfilling her service obligation at Scudder Memorial Hospital, Ranipet, she joined CMC and completed her M.Sc. in Community Health Nursing in 1993. In response to the institution's evolving needs, she graciously transitioned to the Department of Psychiatric Nursing, where she played a pivotal role in student education and staff supervision, and continued working until October 1997. She then moved to Bahrain to work as an instructor for a brief period, and returned to CMC in 1998 as a Lecturer. She finished her Ph.D. in Psychiatric Nursing in 2010. Dr. Manoranjitham taught students across all levels-GNM, B.Sc., P.B.B.Sc., P.B.D., M.Sc., and Ph.D.-and was known for integrating theory and clinical practice, shaping students into compassionate, competent psychiatric nurses. As an accomplished researcher, she has authored over 40 publications and guided many postgraduate students in research. Her Ph.D. work on developing a nursing intervention to reduce suicide among the population remains a valued resource. She received the Best Researcher Award from The Tamil Nadu Dr. M.G.R. Medical University in 2024 and was also awarded a Senior Training Fellowship in psychiatric emergencies in the United States. She continues to mentor Ph.D. scholars and serves as an examiner and committee member for various universities. Administratively, she has held roles such as Additional Deputy Dean, Registrar, and Deputy Director for International Relations and Hospitality.

Dr. Manoranjitham is known for her graciousness, generosity, and unwavering belief in individuals' potential. She quietly supports students in need, fosters meaningful relationships across borders, and offers wise counsel to many. Supported by her loving family, her husband, Mr. Sathiyaseelan, teaches Medical Records at SMH, Ranipet. Their son, Mr. Samuel Rajkumar, is a Talent Advisor at Google, and their daughter-in-law, Ms. Monica Samuel, holds an MSW degree. Dr. Manoranjitham is also a proud grandmother to young Ezra. Her dedication to nursing education, research, and compassionate care has left an indelible legacy. The CMC family expresses heartfelt gratitude for her immense contributions and wishes her a fulfilling and joyful retirement life.

CMC Vellore and Kotak Mahindra Bank Collaborate to Treat Eye Cancer Among Children

On 8th July, 2025, CMC Vellore launched advanced ophthalmic diagnostic and therapeutic services for patients with eye cancers, especially children with retinoblastoma, the most common type of childhood eye cancer, as well as retinopathy of prematurity, an eye disease seen in preterm births. Retinoblastoma is an eye cancer that affects approximately 1 in 15,000-20,000 live births worldwide and is typically diagnosed before the age of five. However, with early detection and advanced treatment modalities, the prognosis for life and eye salvage is excellent.

The equipment, financed by a CSR grant from Kotak Mahindra Bank Limited (KMBL), included a retinal wide field digital system - a high-end wide field camera for imaging the insides of affected eyes, a diode laser transpupillary thermotherapy unit- a laser machine to treat eye tumours, a new tonometer for measuring eye pressure as well as a selective laser trabeculoplasty software to treat glaucoma, the second most common cause of preventable blindness. In addition to these, the equipment will also support the treatment and management of other retinal diseases.

The CSR grant from KMBL also supported the procurement of an advanced life support (ICU) ambulance to facilitate seamless inter-hospital transfers for the Emergency Medical Service (EMS) of CMC Vellore. CMC's EMS Doctors, paramedics, and nurses cater to around 1,000 critically ill adult and paediatric patients every month. The 24-hour phone helpline available to the public enables a rapid and lifesaving response to emergencies in the local community.

The inauguration and dedication ceremony began with a prayer by Rev. Dr. Finney Alexander, Head of Chaplaincy, followed by a welcome address by Dr. Deepa John (Professor and Head of Pediatric Ophthalmology). The chief guest of the occasion was Dr. Baranidharan, Deputy Director, Health Services, Vellore; he was welcomed by Dr. Lekha Mary Abraham, Professor and Head of Ophthalmology. Dr. Selvamani B, Associate Director (Finance), offered felicitations. Dr. Deepthi Kurian, Associate Professor, Department of Ophthalmology, gave a brief overview of the newly procured equipment.

The plaque was unveiled by Mr. Alex Thomas, Associate Vice President, Kotak Mahindra Bank, and a vote of thanks was rendered by Dr. Deepa John.

The equipment was declared open for use by a symbolic cutting of the ribbon by the chief guest, Dr. Baranidharan.





BLS Training Conducted at Government Place of Safety, Vellore

On 30th June 2025, Project YUVA, Adolescent Medicine, Paediatrics Unit-III, in collaboration with the Paediatric Critical Care Unit, conducted a Basic Life Support (BLS) and First Aid training session at the Government Place of Safety, Vellore, primarily for adolescent boys undergoing rehabilitation there. The session was attended by approximately 65 participants, including adolescent boys residing at the facility as well as the staff members who provide their care.

The training aimed to introduce participants to the core principles of Basic Life Support for adults, Children and infants, such as recognition of an unresponsive victim, performing CPR, managing airway obstructions (choking), and responding to medical emergencies such as snakebites and bleeding. The session combined practical demonstrations, small group practice, and hands-on opportunities for participants to learn and reinforce these vital skills under close supervision. The PICU team led the training with great enthusiasm. Their approachable teaching style and clear demonstrations made the session engaging, interactive, and easy to follow. The boys responded with equal excitement and curiosity, actively participating and showing eagerness to learn.

The team from the Paediatric Critical Care Unit included Dr. Ebor Jacob, Professor & Head; Dr. Jolly Chandran, Professor; Dr. Koshy Alan, Associate Professor; Dr.Sanketh, Assistant Professor; Mr. Dinesh Kumar, Associate Professor, College of Nursing; Mr. D. I. Amul Raj, Senior Critical Care Therapist; Mr. Abraham Benson, Critical Care Therapist; Ms. Sophia R., Critical Care Therapist; Mr. V. Ganesh, Office Facilitator; and Ms. Nitha, Office Facilitator. Project YUVA, which works to educate adolescents on health and empowerment, identified the need for such capacity-building activities among vulnerable youth. This session marks a meaningful step toward equipping adolescents with practical, real-world knowledge that can help save lives. We express our heartfelt thanks to the Paediatric Critical Care Unit for their generous involvement. We also thank the Government Place of Safety for their cooperation and support in facilitating this initiative. Project YUVA looks forward to conducting more such sessions in similar institutions, reinforcing the belief that every young person deserves access to life-saving health education.



Clinical Epidemiology unit organised the Clinical Trials Workshop in Collaboration with McMaster University

The Clinical Epidemiology Unit, in collaboration with McMaster University, Canada, organised a 5-day Clinical Trials workshop on "Design, Analyses, Interpretation and Reporting of Phase III Randomised Clinical Trials: Current State-of-the-Art" between 30th June and 4th July, 2025 at the Stem cell research centre auditorium, Rehab campus, Bagayam. The workshop began with an inauguration ceremony. Dr. Vignesh Kumar, Professor, Clinical Epidemiology Unit and the course co-ordinator, delivered the welcome address. Ms. Saramma Kuruvilla, Chaplain, inaugurated the workshop with a word of prayer. Dr.L.Jeyaseelan, Professor of Biostatistics, Mohammad Bin Rashid University, Dubai, Adjunct Professor, Clinical Epidemiology Unit introduced the extramural faculties Dr. Shrikant Bangdiwala, Director and Professor of Biostatistics, Population Health Research Institute, McMaster University, Canada, Ms. Ananta Bangdiwala, Biostatistician, University of Minnesota and Mr. Kumar Balasubramanian, Statistical Operations Manager, Population Health Research Institute, McMaster University. Dr.Shrikant Bangdiwala introduced the workshop to the participants. The faculty also included Dr. Abraham Peedicayil, Adjunct Professor, Clinical Epidemiology Unit, Dr. Visalakshi Jeyaseelan, WHO, Geneva and Dr. Thambu David, Senior Professor, Clinical Epidemiology Unit.

The topics covered were Introduction to Randomized Controlled Trials, different phases of clinical trials, parallel, cross over, factorial, adaptive and to stage study designs, superiority and non-inferiority hypotheses, cluster randomisation, permuted block and optimised randomisation, Artificial Intelligence in randomized clinical trials sample size calculation, analysis of primary and secondary outcomes, stochastic curtailment, conditional power, early stopping of clinical trials, intention to treat, per protocol analysis, Ethical considerations, Systematic Reviews and Meta–Analysis, Reading literature, Study Conduct, Internal and external monitoring. The workshop consisted of lectures and group activity. Forty-one participants from CMC and institutions from all over the country attended the workshop. The participants had a diverse background including clinicians, statisticians, allied health and complementary medicine practitioners. The feedback was positive with a suggestion to continue similar and advanced workshops in future. The workshop was coordinated by the CEU faculty Mr. Madhan Kumar and Mr. Fredrick.





How to Succeed in Interviews – A Session for Staff Children

Obituaries

Dr. Sundaram V. Ramanan (MBBS batch of 1954) passed away on 15th February, 2025. Dr. Sundaram Venkata Ramanan (MBBS batch of 1954), known to friends and family as "Ramanan", died peacefully on February 15, at home in West Hartford, Connecticut, with his wife at his side. He was 91.

Dr. Ramanan was born on 21 June 1933 in Calicut, Kerala, India, to Tarakad A. Sundaram and Seethalakshmi Sankara Iyer, and raised in Ceylon (as Sri Lanka was then known) from his infancy after his father was asked to serve there as a medical

officer in the tea estates. After studying at the Royal College and Saint Thomas College (in Mount Lavinia), he was transferred during World War II to Saint Thomas College, Gurutalawa, in the highlands of Ceylon. There, he completed the University of London GCE 'A' Level examination, and returned to India to study medicine at the Christian Medical College, Vellore, following in his father's footsteps. His medical education continued in the British National Health System, where he was mentored by Dr. Israel (Haematology/Oncology) in the Manchester Royal Infirmary, UK. His training culminated in the Membership of the Royal Colleges of Physicians, Edinburgh. In 1969, Dr. Ramanan and his wife, Dr. Chitra, emigrated to the United States, joining the faculty of the West Virginia University School of Medicine. He won the prestigious Clinician of the Year Award in his first years on faculty. This was the first of multiple awards recognizing his excellence as a teacher and mentor over his 60+ year career. Since 1976, he served on the faculty of the University of Connecticut School of Medicine, until his retirement at age 90. His work included serving as Chief of Hematology at Mount Sinai Hospital, then serving in the Adult Primary Care Unit of St. Francis Hospital for the final 30 years of his career, educating the "pluripotential" medical student and internal medicine resident.

Dr. Ramanan was never one to turn down a chance for adventure. During medical school, he saw a posting that the Indian Government offered international students a train journey anywhere in the country. Off he went, choosing the longest route available, traveling from Vellore to Kashmir. There, in 1959, he trekked in the snow, halfway to the peak of Mt. Everest, unassisted by a Sherpa or guide. In 1963, after knowing her for just a few days, he married Dr. Chitra. They spent the next 62 years supporting each other through life in London and Manchester, UK, Morgantown, West Virginia, and, for nearly 50 years, in West Hartford. One of his many moments of pride was when he and his wife shook hands with Queen Elizabeth II. Their love was grounded in being each other's best friend, supporting each other unconditionally, and providing the same loving support to their children, Kumar and Radhika, and their beloved grandchildren, Kobe, Jude, Kylie and Nikolai.





He was predeceased by his parents and his brother, Murali. Anyone who knew Dr. Ramanan knows him to be an intellect full of curiosity, compassion and laughter. He was a man of integrity, an animated storyteller and an eternal optimist, quick with a joke or silly song. Along with his wife, he travelled to all continents of the world, passing this love of travel to his children and grandchildren. He was a treasure and will be dearly missed. Services were held at the Carmon Funeral Home, Windsor, CT, on Saturday, February 22 at 11 am.
